ANNEXURE – III

Student's feedback analysis:

A feedback from the students is taken to understand the teaching quality of the teachers of the college. A questionnaire containing twenty on qualitative questions of two hundred and ten point scale is prepared and randomly distributed among the students. In response to the questions students are asked to quantify the individual teachers from 1 to 10 marks points. The sample is 480 students. During 2016-17, out of the total 72, 64 teachers of the college have been evaluated by the students and their analysis is figured out in the following table.

The table shows that more numbers of teachers (46.87%) is ranked in 91-100 percentage point whereas one teacher each ranking is 51-60 percentage scale. Second highest ranking is from 81-90 categories whereas 20.31 per cent has reached 71-80 point categories. Thus, it reveals that 1 teachers who ranked below 61 per cent need some orientation, refresher and motivational courses for their teaching, learning and research improvement.

ANNEXURE-IV

BEST PRACTICES:

1. Title of the practice: Book bank facility for poor meritorious students

Goals: The goals of this practice are:

- 1. To provide service to the poor meritorious students for enhancing learning process.
- 2. To help them by providing more text and reference books.

The practice:

Library recouces like books, journals and periodicals are an essential part of an educational institution. the libraries are constituted to lend books as wells provide reading spaces to the students, teachers and researchers. Sometimes it is observed that some students want to lend more books other than general procedure of borrowing two books for ten days. As the case enquired, it is found that the students belonging to poor families want more books due to financial crunch of their families. Therefore, in order to provide more books to these students the central library of the institute introduced the Book Bank facility scheme. In this process the HoDs are requested to recommend the names of the students for availing Book Bank facility. As and when the library received the recommendations the Library Advisory Committee select the student and special library card has been issued. Through this facility a student can borrow additional four books for one month time. They are allowed to renew the same book if there is no booking of that book by other users.

Evidence of success:

Since inception of this scheme in 2001 more than 1000 students had been benefited so far.

Problem encountered and resource required:

The primary problem encountered is that due to large number of books are issued, therefore, other normal users are failed to get the benefit of these books. Secondly, the users of this facility do not return the books within one month, so other students are deprived from using these books.

As the demand under Book Bank facility is increasing thus, more resources are required to procure books. But fund provided by the institute is not enough to purchase more books
