THE COLLEGE AT A GLANCE

1. PROFILE OF THE COLLEGE:

Located at Gargaon, a place of great historical and tourist importance, the Gargaon College, established on 7th September 1959, is one of the premier institutions of higher education in Assam. It is situated at a distance of 16 KM east of Sivasagar town and 2.5 KM away from the Simaluguri Railway Station.

In the historical context, Gargaon was the capital of the glorious Ahom kingdom for 156 years i.e. from 1539 A.D. to 1695 A.D. During this long period, fifteen successive kings were crowned on to the throne starting from Siu-Klen-Miung alias Gargaya Raja to Siu-Pat-Pha alias Gadadhar Singha. The Kareng Ghar, the seven storied Royal Palace of the Kings, situated within Gargaon and such other ancient monuments like the Storehouse, the Golaghar & the Ramparts surrounding the entire area and built to protect the palace from enemies still remind of the grandeur of the illustrious Ahom Kings and Assamese people of the past.

Affiliated to Dibrugarh University, the college came under the deficit grants in-aid system of the Govt. of Assam in 1966. The college has three faculties in Arts, Science and Commerce and there are eighteen departments at present, viz Assamese, English, Economics, Political Science, History, Education, Sociology, Geography, Geology, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Statistics, Rural Development and Commerce. The College imparts education to more than two thousand students in every academic year with the support of an efficient and dedicated teaching staff.

The College has been assessed and re-accredited by the NAAC in the year 2019. 4. ADMISSION PROCEDURE AND REQUIREMENTS:

4.1. ELIGIBILITY:

For Under Graduate Programme (CBCS):

A candidate must be passed Higher Secondary Examination of Assam Higher Secondary Education Council or an equivalent examination recognized by Dibrugarh University.

4.2 ADMISSION PROCEDURE:

- For admission to the college, application should be made in the prescribed form online only. For details kindly visit our website www.gargaoncollege.org.
- ii) Admission to the College is strictly on merit and subjected to the approvalof the Selection Committee and the Principal. A merit list of the selected candidates will be brought out on time together with a waiting list. The candidates selected should get themselves admitted within the specified time frame failing which they will forfeit their claim as the admission would be on first come first basis.. It is to be mentioned here that after the expiry

- of the time frame for admission from the first merit list the vacant seats, if there are, will be filled up by candidates from the waiting list.
- iii) There is reservation of seats for S.C. & S.T. students as per Government Rules. A few seats may be allotted to the students having outstanding performance in the field of Sports and Culture.
- iv) There is provision for reservation of seats for differently abled persons as per government rules.
- v) Candidates seeking admission against reserved seats must submit attested copies of certificates from appropriate authority along with the application form.
- vi) Candidates who have passed the qualifying examinations earlier than the current year must submit a gap certificate regarding his/her activities during that period from proper authority.
- vii) Candidates seeking admission must produce originals of all the submitted documents at a later time which will be duly notified as and when required.
- viii) Candidates seeking admission to the College will be interviewed on the specified dates as per Notification.
 - ix) The following documents must be attached with the online admission form in **jpg format** (size max 100kb) at the time of submission:
 - a) Mark sheets of the examinations passed.
 - b) Birth Certificate/ H.S.L.C. Admit Card
 - Provisional certificate from the Head of the institution last attended.
 - d) Gap certificate, if any.
 - Necessary certificates/documents from proper authority in case of reserved seats.

f) A basic profile of the candidate with the following data: (Mandatory)

- 1. Name of the Candidate; 2. Father's Name; 3. Mother's Name;
- 4. E-mail id; 5. Mobile No.; 6. Bank account no.; 7. Name of the bank; 8. Branch of the bank; 9. IFS Code.

N.B.: The above mentioned data cannot be changed during the entire tenure in the college. An undertaking available in the college website must be submitted alongwith the form.

5. FEE STRUCTURE:

As per the guidelines for admission into educational institutions by the Government of Assam, admission fee is waived for this academic session. As such, the candidates need not submit any income certificates at the time submission of forms. However, a candidate must be a domicile of Assam in order to avail the fee waiver benefit.

6. RULES & REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGE:

6.1 INTERNAL EXAMINATION:

In every academic year there will be two Sessional Examinations in each academic session. The concerned department will conduct departmental seminars, group discussions and assignments as per D.U. examination rules.

- 1. The marks allotted for Internal Assessment (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
 - *a)* Sessional/In-Semester Examination I (Written) 40% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
 - b) Sessional/In-Semester Examination II (Written) 40% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.

c) Seminar/ Group Discussion - 20% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.

Each Sessional/In-Semester examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answer scripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University. The students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/institute cons cerned.

- 2. After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
- 3. There shall be no provision for "repeat"/ "betterment" in the Ses sional/In-Semester examination. If a student misses any Sessional/In-Semester examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teacher may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- 4. The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
- 5. If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall jointly conduct the process of internal assessment.
- 6. If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear in the End-Semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The college/ institutes shall notify the same prior to filling up forms for examinations.
- 7. At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begins) the concerned College shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper mark sheets to the University. The University may call the answer scripts from the college/ institute at any time during the academic sessions.

6.2 ATTENDANCE:

All the Students must attend classes regularly. The minimum attendance should be 80% of the classes held in each subject in an academic year. Students whose attendance falls below 80% but above 60% will be considered as non-collegiate. Students with attendance below 60% will be debarred from appearing in the End-Semester Examination and treating as dis-collegiate. Internal Assessment System is followed as per Dibrugarh University Rule. No student will be given allotted marks unless they meet the assessment criteria.

6.3 MAINTENANCE OF COLLEGE DISCIPLINE:

All the students are required to maintain strict discipline in and around the college. Students who disobey college rules and regulations are liable to disciplinary actions like issue of compulsory transfer certificate and even expulsion from the college. Any of the following acts by a student shall be considered as an offence:

- i) Ragging is strictly prohibited in the college. Students found indulged in such activities will be immediately expelled from the college and legal action will be taken in accordance with the Hon'ble Supreme Court verdict.
- ii) Violation of college uniform.
- iii) Habitual Unpunctuality.
- iv) Various forms of immoral and indecent acts.
- v) Resorting to violence of any kind.
- vi) Disobedience to college authority and teachers.
- vii) Damaging, defacing or devaluing any College property.
- viii) Holding of any meeting in the College or Hostel premises or College Play Ground without prior permission of the Principal.
- ix) Use of unfair means in the College examinations.
- x) Smoking and chewing of Tobacco, Pan-Masala is strictly prohibited. Use of Mobile Phones or any other Audio Devices is strictly banned within the college campus.

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6.4 COLLEGE UNIFORM

- **College Uniform for Boys**: White Shirt and formal black trousers. Black sweater in winter. Low waist pants and Swiss pants are not allowed.
- College Uniform for Girls: Muga or muga coloured Mekhela, white cotton chadar with sky blue border, sky blue sleeved blouse/White Salwar, Sky Blue Kurta (below knee length) and white Dupatta. Black sweater in winter. Patiala, churidar pant Leggings are not allowed.

6.5 DRESS CODE OF STUDENTS

The College is proud of its uniform and expects it to be worn correctly at all times. A student must wear the uniform while attending classes and any other activities of the college. Correct official uniform is required for :

- Incorrect uniform, or a mixture of college uniform, sports gear and civilian clothes, is not acceptable in the college campus.
- Students' uniform should be always neat and clean.
- Students are expected to wear their hair styled in a reasonably conventional way. Hair must be kept tidy throughout the normal activities of a college day.
- Unnatural hairdo with colours, or extreme colouring or patches of colour is not permitted.
- Girls' hair must not hang below the shoulders and must be clear of the face and eyes. Clips may be worn by girls to contain the hair. Long hair must be neatly tied up or back.
- Makeup Students should not wear makeup of any kind.

Jewellery - A wristwatch may be worn. Students should not wear necklaces around the neck. Girls with pierced ears may wear one matching pair of small, plain, silver or gold, unobtrusive studs in the lower part of each earlobe. Students are not permitted to wear excessive jewelry, such as dangling earring, fancy bangles, bracelets, veil, headdress and other related accessories.

6.6 IDENTITY CARD AND BADGE:

An Identity Card and Badge will be issued to every student at the time of admission. The card contains a holder along with a passport size recent photograph of the student duly endorsed by the Principal. Identity card is non-transferable. A student must keep the identity card and he/she must produce the same whenever asked for. The Student must surrender his/her Identity Card at the end of the academic year for renewal.

6.7 MIGRATION AND ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATE:

Students from Boards or University other than SEBA, AHSEC and the Gauhati University shall have to produce a Migration Certificate at the time of admission. They must also obtain an Eligibility Certificate from the AHSEC and G.U. for admission by paying the required fees.

6.8 LABORATORY FACILITY:

The College has a number of laboratories well equipped with the necessary apparatus to carry out practical classes. The college is in the process of upgrading the laboratories so as to provide the students with better working facility.

7. HOSTEL FACILITIES:

The college has separate hostels for both boys and girls. The girls' hostel called Chao Ching Konwari Girls' Hostel has a capacity of 150 while the boys' hostel named as Suklengmung Boys' Hostel has 45 number of seats.

7.1 HOSTEL ADMISSION AND HOSTEL RULES:

- 1. Application for hostel seats is to be submitted in the concern office on the day of admission.
- 2. Seats are allotted on the basis of merit cum distance.
- Students admitted to the hostel shall follow the hostel rules strictly.
- 4. All Applicants must submit medical certificate. Failing to provide medical certificate, seats will not be allotted.

7.2 HOSTEL RULES:

The boarders of the hostel must abide by the following hostel rules.

- Every boarder of the hostel will have to observe the timing of breakfast, meal, tiffin, study hours and evening roll calls circulated by the Superintendent of the hostel.
- 2. During study hours no boarder should remain outside without permission from the Superintendent.
- 3. Drinking of alcohol or use of drugs shall be considered as a major offence and will be dealt with severely.
- 4. Leave of absence from the hostel must be obtained in advance from the Superintendent. If a boarder is absent from the hostel without permission from the Superintendent it will be considered a major offence.

- 5. No outsider should be allowed during the study hours or College hours and no guest should be entertained without prior permission from the Superintendent.
- 6. No boarder will quit the hostel without permission which may be granted only on payment of all the outstanding arrear against him/her.
- 7. Explusion from the hostel implies expulsion from the College and vice versa.
- 8. College hostel will remain closed during the summer vacation and puja vacation and no boarder will be allowed to reside in the hostel in any private capacity without permission from the Principal.
- 9. The mess dues must be paid by the boarder within 15th days of the each month or within such a date as may be notified by the hostel Superintendent. Non-payment of hostel dues in time would invite disciplinary action.
- The Superintendent will maintain a conduct register. The boarders are liable to be punished and have their names entered in the register for misconduct.
- 11. Cases of serious indiscipline in the hostel will be reported by the Superintendent to the Principal for appropriate action.
- 12. All boarders must attend classes regularly.
- 13. Hostel admission is meant for one year only. However, a boarder who fails to clear End-Semester Examinations in three semesters consecutively shall have to vacate the seat immediately without any further notice in this regard.

PART - III ADDITIONAL ACADEMIC COURSES

1. DIBRUGARH UNIVERSITY DISTANCE EDUCATION STUDY CENTRE:

Started in the year 2000, the centre at present provides courses in M.A., M.Sc. and M.Com. It offers M.A. in Assamese, English, Sociology, Political Science, Economics, Education and Mathematics. The centre also provides M.Sc. in Mathematics.

In addition to this, the centre also offers under graduate programmes in Arts stream only.

2. KRISHNA KANTA HANDIQUE STATE OPEN UNIVERSITY STUDY CENTRE:

The Centre was begun in 2008 which offers an entire range of courses as per the university curriculum.

3. SWAYAM:

The Ministry of Human Resource Development launched the 'SWAYAM", a web portal that provides high quality education to the doorstep of everyone. It is an online interactive learning platform including video lectures, reading materials, assignments etc. that could end up in securing credits after completing the assessment system. SWAYAM has more than 400 courses covering all the subjects at undergraduate and post graduate levels.

PART - IV

READERS' HUB

1. THE GARGAON COLLEGE CENTRAL LIBRARY:

The central Library of the College is located in the centre of the College premises. It is newly constructed from the grant of State Government. The Library is equipped with sizeable collection of books, which includes texts and other reference books. The library subscribes quite a good number of newspapers, journals, periodicals, quarterly magazines and other magazines. The library house comprises three reading rooms with adequate furniture where readers can utilize the library facilities. Moreover, each Department of the College has their own Departmental libraries which cater to the needs for advanced consultation. The College has Internet (Broadband facility) and the Library of automation under SOUL System.

1.1 LIBRARY RULES:

Every student is expected to avail the library facilities for his/her academic and personality development. Students' should observe the following rules :-

- 1. Readers shall maintain perfect order and silence in the library.
- 2. Making noise, spitting, smoking, or doing anything else which may disturb other readers or which may be against the discipline of the library is strictly prohibited.
- 3. No person is entitled or permitted to mutilate, disfigure or deface by writing in the margins, by underlining sentences, by marking passages or by damaging in any other way, a book, periodical, map or chart or any other property of the library.

- 4. A reader responsible for any damage caused to the reading materials or to any other property of the library shall be required to replace the reading material or pay for the property, besides the penalty imposed upon him by the librarian.
- 5. If books issued to a member are found mutilated at the time of return, he/ she shall have to replace the same or pay the price thereof. Therefore, members are requested to check the books thoroughly before getting them issued.
- 6. Books must be returned/ renewed within 10 (ten) days from the date of issue. A fine of Rupee 1.00 per book per day will be levied if a borrowed book is kept beyond the date of return.
- 7. No tracing or mechanical reproduction of any books, maps or manuscripts shall be made without due permission of the librarian.
- 8. If the students have any complaint about the services provided by the library, they should not enter into any argument with the library staff. Instead, they are advised to bring it to the notice of the librarian.
- 9. Any infringement of the library rules shall lead to cancellation of membership of the library.
- 10. Do not keep any valuable belongings like ornament, currency, mobile etc. At the property counter. If however, it is found to be lost, the library authority will not be responsible for that.
- 11. If the library card is lost by any student, it should be reported to the librarian immediately.

1.2 BOOK BANK FACILITY:

Book Bank facility is made available to the students of each semester based on economic criteria. Under this a selected student is allowed to borrow greater number of books in comparison to that of a regular member.


PART - X

COURSE DESIGN OF THE UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMME (CBCS)

1. The Pattern of CBCS

- The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is a flexible system of learning which is aimed at helping the students to learn at their own pace and adopt an inter-disciplinary approach in learning.
- The various programmes like B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. offered by the university are divided into different courses.
- A Programme (e.g. B.A.) is divided into a number of courses. A course is a unit
 of instruction or segment of subject area under any programme. The traditional concept 'paper' is replaced by 'course.'
- Each course carries a certain number of credits which a student has to earn during an academic session.
- The word 'credit' defines the quantum of contents/ syllabus prescribed for a
 course and determines the number of hours of instruction required per week.
 Thus, normally in each of the courses, credits will be assigned on the basis of
 the number of lectures/ tutorials/ laboratory works and other forms of learning
 required to complete the course contents
 - i) 1 lecture per week= 1 hr duration per week= 1 credit
 - ii) 1 tutorial per week= 1 hr duration per week= 1 credit
 - iii) 1 practical per week= 2 hrs duration per week= 1credit

2. COURSE TYPE



- Core Courses: The set of Core Courses are compulsory components of an Academic Programme. These Courses are to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/ discipline concerned.
- Elective Courses: The programmes would also include a pool of Elective Courses from which a student is required to choose few.

These courses may be intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE)
 OR

Inter-departmental OR inter-disciplinary, i.e. Generic Elective (GE)

- For the students of the same discipline/ subjects these elective courses shall be intra-disciplinary and shall be called DSE Courses. If the students of other discipline/ subjects opt these electives shall be considered as inter-disciplinary and shall be called GE courses.
- Ability Enhancement Courses: The Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two kinds-
- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses.'
 These courses shall be of inter-disciplinary in nature.
- Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) comprises Environmental Science, Communicative English and Alternative English/ Communicative Hindi/ MIL. It is to be noted that there shall be a Multi-disciplinary Course for the B.A. and B. Com programmes (Non-Honours).
- Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are designed to provide the students with value-based and skill-based knowledge. A student is required to choose from a cluster of courses which would have both theory and lab/hands-on/training/ fieldwork.
